When I visited our programs in Uganda, I saw this in Peter, a refugee from South Sudan who started as a volunteer and is now a full-time team member. Peter's neighbors are fellow refugees like Lucy, who started a business after Action Against Hunger taught her how to grow mushrooms. UPDATES FROM THE FIELD

SOMALIA







In Somalia, our teams taught 1,500 mothers how to spot malnutrition in their children using a simple tool: the color-coded Mid Upper Arm Circumference (MUAC) band.

When cases are found, children are referred to the local Action Against Hunger Health and Nutrition Center for treatment – the earlier a case is found, the easier it is for a malnourished child to recover.

As the project was implemented, our staff noticed that not just mothers, but fathers, too, were taking their children's measurements.

"I shared with my husband what we learned, and he wanted to learn how to use the MUAC tape. I took him through the process," says one mother named Kafiyo.

"As fathers, it is our duty to know the health status of our children. I have four children under five years old, and I make it my responsibility to check all of them weekly," says her husband, Abdullahi Omar, as he proudly shows off his MUAC band.

Already, our nutrition teams in the area have seen promising results: "It has made our work easier. Parents take the lead in measuring their children, which helps them to quickly see the first signs of malnutrition," says Abdirahman, an Action Against Hunger Community Health Worker.

NIGERIA











The conflict-driven humanitarian crisis in Nigeria's North East is one of the world's ten most severe crises. More than one million children under five years old are acutely malnourished. In 2018, Action Against Hunger reached 3.4 million people in the affected areas with our lifesaving programs.

We screened and treated severely malnourished children; we helped more people to earn an income and to feed their families through cash and vouchers; we improved access to clean water, safe sanitation, and hygiene services; and our mother-to-mother and father-to-father care groups helped displaced parents.

Each day, Gordo walks three hours to collect water for her family. Her husband, Garbicha, does the same search with their cattle: each day, he herds the family's cows in a quest for water that takes hours.


"This situation is very serious. Although we have grass now, if there is no water, our cattle will also die," Garbicha told our staff.

Gordo added: "And if they die, what will we live on?"

As Ethiopia experiences its second severe drought in the last three

years, 3.5 million of the country's children suffer from life-threatening malnutrition. In Somalia, farmers and herders struggle to live through the driest rainy season in decades. Food prices in Kenya continue to rise, driven up by failed harvests.

Severe drought across East Africa has caused a worsening hunger crisis. Action Against Hunger's teams throughout the region are helping communities survive the drought by treating malnourished children, improving access to clean water and safe sanitation, supporting livelihoods and food security, and more.
